



BLESSING FOR EXPECTANT MOTHERS

9:30am Tuesday 17 October @ SJV

All parishioners are invited to Mass at St John Vianney Co-Cathedral on **Tuesday 17 October at 9:30am** to pray for all mothers, especially those who preparing to give birth or are experiencing difficulties in their pregnancy. At Mass the



blessing for expectant mothers will be prayed as a sign of our prayerful affection and support.

The blessing is connected to St Gerard Majella who was born on April 6, 1726 in Muro, Italy. He was the son of a tailor who died when Gerard was 12, leaving the family in poverty. Gerard tried to join the Capuchin order but was denied because of his ill health. He was later accepted as a Redemptorist brother serving the Redemptorist congregation as gardener, tailor, fundraiser, peacemaker and spiritual adviser.

He was a man of great depth and insight, prayer and kindness. He was a mystic and a reader of hearts, ever seeking to be perfectly obedient to the will of God. He responded to false accusation, which was later retracted, with great patience. Unfortunately his health was never good. He died from tuberculosis on October 16, 1755 at 29 years of age. His feast day is October 16th.

Gerard Majella is known today as "The Mothers' Saint." The origin of this title comes from an incident that happened in the last months of his short life.

Once, as St. Gerard was leaving the home of his friends, the Pirofalo family, one of the daughters called after him because he had forgotten his handkerchief. In a moment of prophetic insight Gerard said: "Keep it. It will be useful to you some day." The handkerchief was treasured as a precious souvenir of Gerard. Years later the girl to whom he had given it was in danger of death during childbirth. She remembered the words of Gerard, and called for the handkerchief. Almost immediately the danger passed and she delivered a healthy child.

The Redemptorists were not the first to encourage devotion to St. Gerard. The popularity of this devotion is due to all the Italian women and mothers who believed and promoted their confidence and trust in the intercession of St. Gerard. It was Italian mothers who spread this devotion throughout Italy and Italian immigrant women who took the devotion with them to many parts of the world.

Gerard's intercession is requested for children (unborn children in particular), for those experiencing difficulty in childbirth, and mothers (expectant mothers in particular). If you expecting a child you can approach any of the priests for the blessing. Or, come to the Mass and receive the blessing with the prayerful support of our parish community.

Please note that the Intention list will close 27th August.



RU OK?

On Thursday 14th September, we mark **RU OK Day**. We remind ourselves to be especially concerned for one another, making sure to ask another person, particularly if they seem down, about how they are travelling. A kind word can bring light to someone's darkened heart. A sincere question can lift a person's spirit because he or she feels that someone else cares enough to ask.

The Church gives us a very simple and powerful gesture that emphasises our concern for each other in the Eucharist. In the Rite of Peace, after the Our Father, we pray for peace and unity for our Church community and "for the whole human family". We express to each other by the Sign of Peace our "ecclesial communion and mutual charity before communicating in the Sacrament" (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, 82). It is a moment of confirming our brothers and sisters, who may feel in the dark, with the light of our kind attention in the Lord Jesus.



In this spirit of charity, let us pray for anyone who has taken their life when their heart felt burdened by the pain we did not see. Let us also pray for all people who do not feel OK that God will console them and give us the compassion to help them.

Just as you changed from being disobedient to God, and now enjoy mercy because of their disobedience, so those who are disobedient now – and only because of the mercy shown to you – will also enjoy mercy eventually. God has imprisoned all men in their own disobedience only to show mercy to all mankind.

He replied, 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the house-dogs.' She retorted, 'Ah yes, sir; but even house-dogs can eat the scraps that fall from their master's table.' Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, you have great faith. Let your wish be granted.' And from that moment her daughter was well again.

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

On Catholic Dogs

A pagan woman approaches a Jewish man and she begs Jesus to heal her daughter.

Jesus gives a dismissive answer to the woman: 'It is not fair to take the children's bread and throw it to the house dogs.' The children are obviously the Jewish people.

This remarkable pagan woman stands her ground and engages in a verbal joust with Jesus! She argues: 'Yes, Lord, but even the house dogs get the crumbs that fall from their master's table.'

Jesus recognises her faith and the daughter was healed. This story was put in the Gospels to show how Jesus extended his saving mission to non-Jews in Pagan territory.

That is Good News for billions of non-Jewish people over the course of history since then and into the future. That is why we are truly 'Catholic', which, as you know, is the Greek for 'world-wide'.

We could pause for a moment to celebrate this Canaanite woman as the first 'Catholic'!

DAY OF PRAYER FOR CREATION

In his message for the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation on 1 September 2023, Pope Francis calls us to a change of heart and "the renewal of our relationship with creation so that we no longer see it as an object to be exploited but cherish it instead as a sacred gift from our Creator." Pope Francis encourages us to avoid waste and to promote practices that promote care for our environment and the earth's resources for future generations.

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
